



How did the Bea Mesquias Offering start?—We read in Luke 8:3 how Christ was provided through faithful support of others, and especially through women.

It was in 2016, that several individuals noticed the financial support of a faithful lady servant, Bea Mesquias, who gave to missions with great joy. Several individuals, including Ruben Chairez, Bulmaro Luna and others recommended that a missionary offering be collected under the name, "Bea Mesquias". Her personal goal is to spread the message of Jesus Christ to a hurting world, work toward missions, give generously, and inspire other followers of Christ, to give toward mission work in the Hispanic churches.

What is the Week of Prayer and Missionary Offering Bea Mesquias?—It is a week that has been designated to pray, support, and give for missionary work in the state of Texas. Sister Bea Mesquias heart's desire, as the first female President of the Texas Hispanic Baptist Convention, was to do missions.

Witnessing the love, the passion for missions, and what she has done in the work of missions in Texas, a group of leaders of the CBHT decided that the Offering of the Week of Prayer bear her name, Bea Mesquias.

Today, Bea Mesquias is the Execut Director-Treasurer of the UFM of Texas and does not accept a salary for her work; on the contrary, she gives generously to support financially in order to achieve the goal of each Week of Prayer, so that God's work can be accomplished.

Bea, not only shows love, compassion, for mission work and people, but also encourages women to pray and give. Her encouragement and support also include scholarships to young people in order to continue their academic studies.

The effort to start the first Bea Mesquias Week of Prayer Mission Offering, started when Rolando Aguirre and Silvia Ake, as

well as several other brothers, worked to print the first small notebook for the Week of Prayer. Not having the experience, but with the help and guidance of God, the first book of Week of Prayer was completed.

Who is Bea Mesquias?—Bea was born in Robstown, Texas. At the age of 9 she accepted Jesus as Lord and Savior during a Vacation Bible School. Her grandparents took her to the temple every Sunday to make sure she grew spiritually. She graduated

from Del Mar College with a degree in Nursing and Business. She then obtained her Medical Analyst Degree from St. Mary's University.

She married Richard Mesquias and they had four sons. I was with Bea when she shared this with me: "I remember my childhood days vividly. My story began in our home with my father giving life, with his gestures and sounds, to those biblical stories he told us! I also remember my grandmother talking to me about the Word of God so that I could have that relationship with my beloved Jesus. I desire to continue with the legacy of serving my Lord and Savior, by passing it on to the

Bea confesses that she never imagined what Christ would do with her to this day. Nursing study, her love for God, and vocation for people, led her to go do mission work. When she worked as a nurse, she asked a coworker to cover her work shift, and she sacrificed the salary she received to be able to do missions.

next generations".

It all started in 1974, when she was invited to help out as a nurse together with dentists in the River Ministry. After this experience, Bea continued to go every year; bring young people with her to serve in that ministry.

Then in 1975, she was invited to Glorieta to give conferences for women nationwide. In 1976, WMU invited her to be the Texas Leadership Training (TLC) speaker formerly called House Party in Waco Texas.

After two years, in 1978 she was named the first Hispanic Director of the WMU for the Corpus Christi Association. In 1993, Bea went to live in the Valley of Texas. In 2005, she was appointed as the first Hispanic WMU Associate Director of the Rio Grande Valley and served for four years. That's where she decided to start with the ministry called "Families in Missions."

Bea quotes: "I saw another culture, the Hispanic women taking their children wherever they went. It was there where the idea of "Families in Missions" was born, so that together as families, they could participate in the missions.

Our work began when we chose seven churches to help. One of the seven churches we helped was Acts Church in Elsa, Texas that needed a new roof, windows to be repaired, and walls in need of paint. We worked and completed the work for Acts Church. While the men labored on basic construction tasks, the young people and women had Bible and evangelism studies.

"Families in Missions" started in the Rio Grande Valley and as we saw how God worked, we decided to expand to other another area. We then went to San Antonio, Texas to support the Philadelphia Church "New Life Church".

We ministered to the homeless presenting the message of Salvation, reading the Bible, singing, feeding, and distributing food. In the afternoons we had Vacation Bible School for the children and adults from around the nei ghborhood.

In 2008, Bea was named President of the Women's Missionary Union of the State of Texas. She could not help speak about what she had seen God do during the past years she worked in mission efforts.

Bea quotes the Bible truth found in Acts 4:20" Because we cannot stop saying what we have seen and heard". In this Bible verse, Peter and John, Disciples of Christ, witnessed many miracles and the power of God. Despite the dangers and threats from religious leaders, nothing prevented them from continuing to speak of God's power, love, and great salvation that comes from God.

Our sister Bea Mesquias has done a great job in the ministry of "Families in Missions", sharing with other sisters, not only the word of God, but also bringing toys, food, blankets, and clothes to share among the needy families of the Rio Grande. She has a great missionary heart which prompted her to organize missionary trips that included Nuevo Progreso, Torreón, Venezuela, Panama, Chile and Brazil. Bea traveled with women from the State of Texas to bring hope to those who are deprived of physical and spiritual growth.

Something that impacted Bea's life, as a result of the trip to Chile, was not only the destruction of the tsunami that had just passed, but also the poverty conditions she saw in some places. She found people living in small houses similar to trailer homes without insulation, dirt floors, a space for a table with four chairs, and sleeping on the ground. These people shared and sanitary facilities bathrooms with the neighborhood. They visited a nursing home where they met 15 little elderly ladies. Their families couldn't take care of them and the UFM of the Concepción Association had taken the responsibility of sending money to hire six people to take care of them. The administrator and treasurer of the place were all volunteer employees. There were many UFM women who volunteered to keep the place clean and decent so that the elderly ladies could live well. This made a big impact on Bea's heart and she decided to send an offering to help the needs of these people.

In her second trip to Chile, Bea prayed that God allow her to take with her at least five women. To her surprise, God gave her twelve women! Together, they prepared conferences, workshops, and other classes. All this work was done in conjunction with the Baptist Convention of Chile and the president of the Association of the churches they visited.

While they were there, they saw the great need to remodel the place. Immediately the group of ladies managed to raise \$380.00 to buy new chairs, since the chairs were missing armrests. The sisters accompanying Bea, committed to maintain the home of elderly women and to send money monthly for diapers. We all know there's a great need around the world. Maybe some of us cannot travel far, but our offerings, prayers, can provide the opportunity for others to go. We all have the opportunity to do missions, to obey the command of our Lord. This is not an option; it is an order as we find it in Matthew 28:19-20: "Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

In 2013, Bea Mesquias had the

privilege of being named President of the Hispanic Baptist Convention of Texas (CBHT) being the first woman to hold that position. She expressed gratitude to God for being good, because in collaboration with the Buckner organization's ministry, house was constructed and donated by Hispanics for a family in need.


Preparation for the first Week of Prayer Missionary Offering Bea Mesquias at Convention.—The important part of work was the preparation of the first Week of Prayer for our CBHT. The work of publishing printed materials was done in 2014 in order to celebrate the event in 2015. In 2017, the UFM of Texas began to publish the offerings received for the Week of Prayer by providing a financial report of churches and individuals who gave, as well how the funds were used. In the magazine, "La Voz", we included the first financial report of the Week of Prayer Missionary Offering Bea Mesquias of the year 2018. It is Sister Bea's prayer, that missionary trips be made possible through these funds.







Philippians to live a life centered on Christ. For him, living is Christ, and dying is gain. This radical focus challenges us to think about our priorities: Are we living with purpose, loving in unity, and serving with dedication? Is our life a reflection of Christ's love and an expression of His mission in the world?

Paul also encourages us to be "like-minded"—to be united in purpose. This purpose is to share God's love and advance His Kingdom. Paul understood that living in Christ means living in community, supporting each other in love and service.

It's not enough to say that Christ is our life; we have to show it through our actions.

Personal Reflection

In our churches, we often talk about missions, ministry, and evangelism, but are we willing to truly commit? Living for Christ means stepping out in faith and moving beyond our comfort zones. Maybe God is calling you to teach Sunday school, serve in youth ministry, lead a prayer group, or join a missions project.

The key is to adopt Paul's words as our own: "To me, living is Christ." When we understand that our life belongs to Him, service stops feeling like a burden and becomes a joy. We serve not out of obligation but out of gratitude, remembering that Christ gave His life for us..

or me, to live is Christ and to die is gain es ganancia, were the courageous words of the Apostle Paul to the Philippians while he was in prison and in danger of death. This phrase is common among those of us who serve the Lord in any capacity, even though, deep down, we often wish that God would place us in comfortable situations, free from many difficulties or challenges. However, what would happen if you received an unexpected invitation that you simply cannot decline?

The first few days were filled with uncertainty, as I didn't know how God might use me, even though I knew I wasn't prepared. All I could do was pray and seek the Lord's guidance. I remember one night during a prayer meeting at church, God impressed upon me the conviction that I should not worry, because He was going to surprise me.

As I was driving home that night, I received a phone call from Victor Castillo, a pastor friend of mine, who wanted to introduce me to a logistics manager who was looking for a church to take on large weekly donations of food. The manager was very friendly, told me he was a christian, and then asked me a question: What would you do if we gave you a trailer full of several tons of bread every week, in perfect condition?


I replied, I would use it to distribute to the Hispanic churches I represent in Texas and to feed those in need. The manager was convinced by my response, and we began the process and signed agreements. Just a few days later, the first trailer arrived—I

couldn't believe it! God had everything planned and under control.

Today, we have distributed bread to many parts of Texas and Mexico. Just a few days ago, I was informed that over 1,000 people are benefiting daily from this new ministry of the Hispanic Convention in shelters, hospitals, orphanages, rehabilitation centers, and other places. I won't deny it—it's exhausting. But if truly, for me to live is Christ and to die is gain, I must work for His kingdom.

Let us pray:

- 1. That God continues to send more workers to the field.
- 2. That God gives courage and provision to these workers.
- 3. That God grants these workers good health.
- 4. That God raises up volunteers who will join the projects of these workers.

- 1. Meet with your Pastor and plan about the time and place of where to celebrate the Week of Prayer.
- 2. Put a goal as a church to reach this year's goal of \$30,000.00.
- 3. Encourage women (femenil) and the whole church to join to celebrate the Week of Prayer.
- 4. The goal is that our Baptist Churches can join to pray and support the ministries that are presented here.

Suggestions:

- —Each Director of the UFM in the local Church must assign a Week of Prayer Team for the occasion.
- —-The team will help to sensitize the church and will be responsible for preparing the event. (If your church never had a team for a Week of Prayer, but you are reading this material, just gather your own team and offer the event to your church!)

—-The team must begin their own work, the Team must meet to prepare the Week of Prayer.

—Pray for direction as you take this great challenge to prepare the local church to celebrate the Week of Prayer. If necessary, teach about the importance of prayer.

—Sensitize your church by distributing announcements with details about the date and place of the Week of Prayer.

—Plan the details of the event: Make invitations, send text messages, distribute envelopes to promote the offering, encourage people to make book markers,

be sure to explain that this offering will support each of the ministries that are mentioned in this week of Prayer.

Preparation of Decorations:

Most people appreciate an elegantly arranged room. Arrange the space of your local church to decorate for the occasion.

Have that area decorated with colorful balloons, flowers, ornaments that represent the state of Texas. Put the Bible in the center of the table.

Print in large letters the verse for the Week of Prayer 2025: Then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and of one mind. Philippians 2:2. And put it on display to make it easy to read.

Think of ways to encourage church members to be part of this offering. An example is to decorate small milk carton, giving it the shape of a church and having the container work like a piggy bank to encourage the whole family to deposit coins every day.

Even the 8oz/240ml water bottles can be decorated like piggy banks. These examples can be made as projects for children within the churches and thus be involved in supporting the missions.
